

Diploma launch report

Diplomas get off to a flying start across Peterborough

THE new diploma qualifications for 14-19-year-olds were introduced across Peterborough at the start of September. So far, 186 students have signed up for diplomas in IT, Hair and Beauty, Creative and Media and Society, Health and Development.

Society, Health and Development has attracted 98 students, including Michaela Butt (right) who is studying for the advanced diploma – equivalent to 3.5 A levels.

Around 200 businesses across the city have so far pledged support. Industry professionals help tutors design relevant coursework, go into into classes to set projects and then return later in the term to see student presentations. Companies also help with student

visits to premises.

Developer offers support to construction diploma

THE property developer behind Peterborough's exciting Garden Park project is helping to introduce ground-breaking new elements to the building diploma when it launches next year.

What's your idea?

Property development is very creative and visionary. Our idea is to work with the schools and colleges to put a project together around the Peterborough Garden Park development. It will ask the question

IT Diploma

Computer qualifications will go a long way

STUDENTS on the IT Diploma get valuable experience beyond computers, according to IT Diploma leader Tim Hutton.

"It provides a great opportunity to study and gain an insight into business – how organisations work and how to work well with other people," said Mr Hutton.

Thirty students are studying IT at Orton Longueville School. "They have shown great enthusiasm for the hands-on style of the delivery and the opportunity to spend a whole day each week immersed in the subject," Mr Hutton said. "Norwich and Peterborough Building Society (N&P) has offered visits to its offices to view the use of all aspects of ICT, from websites to system controls. It's fascinating for the students."

for and were this year voted the best construction company and fifth best overall company to work for in the UK. Lindum received an award from the *Sunday Times* for being the best mid-size company in the UK for engaging with the education sector.

"This has brought us to the attention of education providers such as Peterborough Regional College where many apprentices and management trainees have attended.

"As a consequence, and because of the active support we give our trainees, I have been asked over the years for advice on course content, work experience, interviewing etc.

"I like the opportunity for change that the diploma offers. Too often a career in the construction industry is only considered after all other options have been exhausted! Young people will get an earlier look at our industry, including tailored work experience, and be better placed to make informed decisions about whether the construction industry is right for them.

"Employers owe it to our industry to recruit the best possible young people and early contact will give us a better chance of succeeding.

"The diploma programme will only succeed if fully supported by local employers. I would urge other local companies to get involved by making a commitment to offer work experience, offer industry specific help and advice and to offer professional back up to college staff/teachers in specialist areas. Think of it as putting something back into the community which provides us with our daily business."

Information for employers

EMPLOYERS stand to get a lot out of the diploma programme, especially if they are able to put something into it. Businesses around Peterborough are already lending their support and reaping the benefits. Your business could get involved too. There are many ways to get involved and many cost nothing but a little bit of your time.



Some fast facts about the new diplomas

- Diplomas are new qualifications for **14-19-year-olds**. There are three levels to study at.
- A **Foundation Diploma** is the same as five GCSEs at grades D-G.
- The **Higher Diploma** is the same as seven GCSEs at grades A*-C.
- An **Advanced Diploma** is the same as 3.5 A levels.
- These four diplomas were offered in Peterborough from September 2009: IT; Creative and Media; Society, Health and Development; Hair and Beauty.
- Three more diplomas will be offered from September 2010: Construction and the Built Environment; Sport and Active Leisure; Business, Administration and Finance.
- Looking further ahead, these subjects are planned and the delivering organisations are looking for businesses to get involved now: Hospitality; Retail Business; Engineering; Manufacturing and Product Design; Environmental and Land Based Studies; Public Services; Travel and Tourism.
